# Voyage of the "Stella".

FROM CAIRO TO LUXOR AND  
RETURN TO CAIRO, WINTER

OF  
1906-1907.

Grandfather. Grandmother. Joe and Cornelia. Rebecca and Frances. and Jeanette arrived in Egypt from Venice November 4 1906. Some of us stayed in Cairo. the rest at Helwan. while Grandfather and Joe hunted for Dahabeyahs up and down the banks of the Nile - plenty of Dahabeyahs - but all too dear for us - at last when Joe had planned to go to Assuan to take the old "Abou Simbel" - we heard through Michael Casira a Greek Antiquity merchant in Cairo. that a countryman of his one. Georges Spiliotti had a good boat the price of which came somewhere near our figures - and while Joe and Cornelia were at Sakkara. spending Sunday with the Lubell's Grandfather went to see the boat. and telegraphed to Joe. that it was a lucky find.

The "Stella" is much bigger than any boat we have ever had before and there is plenty of room in her for us all. with a possible guest - Rebecca is to have a room to herself opposite Grandfather's. while Frances and Jeanette have the large room in the stern.

The Greek. Spiliotti - is a sharp. hard. miser. and a Greek to boot. a combination hard to beat. and we didn't beat him - after many interviews in his shop [opposite Shephard's] we at last came to an understanding and

from Nov 17

the price agreed upon £ 160 for four months - and Joe and Grandpa drew up the contract, which was more formal than heretofore having various lawyer-like clauses, and items such as "In consideration of" etc. suggested by Mr. Blanchard, the kind and very obliging American Antiquity Merchant - near neighbor of the Greeks.

Then the contract was signed and sealed, in the presence of Blanchard, and Mr. Kuli Kas, another Antiquity man, in the latter's up - impressive spectacle, and then some tiresome days waiting about the boat, while the Ramadan festival ended and Bayram began, and dawdling ways of the Orient prevailed, and our words of hustle were hoed and of no avail - the pump didn't work, three windows, only fastened of sashes - two would open - one wouldn't shut, likewise doors would fly open - or couldn't be made to - the bathtub was a disgrace & usual and the pantry fearful - the collection of plates and dishes &c and knives etc was a surprise - fairly complete - and sheets and pur linen more or less abundant. [probably less, as I who write where Ies, am a man]

The dining-sitting room was presently fixed up, and made extremely ugly and homelike, and very opaque it looked, after those of our other n little ships. Abu Simbel - Amun & Waz etc.

one Mahammed, the same sweet-faced Donie came to Cairo on the 9<sup>th</sup> Nov.

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and was present at bargaining and finished Trade - and with Grandpa bought the bulk of our stores. while Grandma and Cornelia looked after the "Fleurant" items. which came to about \$ 160.

Abdullah and Abdulrahman arrived on the 21<sup>st</sup> and with them came the "old folk's" spring beds. and the babies bath tub - we were then ready to start up the river - but delays prevented. and yet. more delays [we never got off so quickly though]

At last on Friday<sup>23</sup> we left the bank and waited an hour near Gieerah for two of the crew. and about 3.30 reached Heliouan. from whence the voyage was really to commence

The little people. with Cornelia and Jeanette. came on board next morning. and our departure was delayed. by the non appearance of the small fellahs with the bread. which was to have followed us. from Cairo. with the Second Reis and two more crew. Francis was recovering from a slight illness. and we were just as well pleased to stay one night. more within a Doctors reach.

On Sunday November 25 we began the Voyage.

We came to anchor at sundown near Es-Saf. and the next day Monday 26<sup>th</sup> a strong South wind kept us all day lying there in a poor position - which we bettered towards sunset by crossing the river. a fierce rain squall was an unpleasant feature of the afternoon.

Tuesday 27<sup>th</sup> South wind. Joe and Cornelia, Rebecca and Grandma and Dovie. Took a long walk. and we spent a lazy day at Kaf. Amar

Ramla

Dovie found at Cairo a small boy named Mahomet Abdal Russell from Sheccal whose uncle had left him alone in Cairo and gone to Alexandria. The boy wanted to go home and we consented to take him. Later we found that he could read and write Arabic and was very smart and quick to learn -

Abdallah put in an appearance one day only and then took to his bed where he stayed in the dark until to night when it was decided to send him home as far as Suez with Joe who went on the night train

Wednesday 28<sup>th</sup> Another day with a south wind

7<sup>th</sup> day

Thursday 29<sup>th</sup> Another day of South wind  
We are getting rather tired of this place  
Only small villages near and poor place for  
supplies - Market day today & Dore is up trying to  
get some meat etc. The Reis has finished his  
awning & so much is done & well. I hope  
of a good day tomorrow the day closes —

Friday 30<sup>th</sup> And another day at Kafir-Amar

Strong wind storm from the South.  
The crew are getting uneasy at the delay as  
they are hired for a month only (as we suppose)  
and as they mostly live up the river they wish  
the extra time after arriving at Suxor, to be with  
their homes. Yesterday the writer amused himself  
making a box for Joe's canvases and today  
he made Tiney's house - of card board - but no  
sooner was it done than the wanted front door  
shimmy - glass windows - steps - bath tub for dolls  
etc. truly one want makes another.

Dore made a trip to Wosta for bread. Rained again  
last night.

9<sup>th</sup>  
day  
1 mile

Saturday Dec. 1<sup>st</sup> This day opens with a beautiful sunrise and a light wind from the South which however soon died out and the men took to tracking at 7:30 A.M.  
12 o'clock The south wind overtook us and at this hour we find ourself looking out of a window at the mud bank at which we are moored only about a mile from our starting place. West wind

And the day ends under the lee of the same mud bank.

10<sup>th</sup> day  
1 mile

Sunday Dec. 2<sup>d</sup>

Today we made about another mile. and such is the way of living on the Nile.

11<sup>th</sup> day  
1 mile

Monday Dec 3<sup>d</sup>

This day commenced fair with no wind at all until about 3 P.M. when a light breeze from the West set in but soon died out after our start and this night we are moored on an island across the river about half a mile from the start. West wind

10<sup>th</sup> day

Tuesday Dec. 4<sup>th</sup> And another South wind  
It's getting monotonous. Dowie walked up  
to Port Said (across the river) to send a tel. to Joe  
but it was refused as orders were that ~~that~~  
office was "closed to European Correspondence"  
Must try tomorrow at Wasta if we get there.  
Mother and the Reis, saying cards at my table don't  
improve my handwriting.

11<sup>th</sup> day  
8 AM

Wednesday Dec. 5 Day opens with the  
usual South wind. About 4 pm. it died  
out and the men took to tracking and —  
we made another mile. — Rain —

The sent Dowie and Yusoff to Wasta to  
try to get a telegram to Joe and find  
more to add to report in case of rain.

The Reis says that this weather  
was expected at Cairo and that Prof.  
Lyce and others were waiting for it  
to blow out — We are ahead of them  
and saving hotel bills in Cairo. If that is  
any consolation.

14<sup>th</sup> day

Thursday Dec. 6. Day opens with a strong wind from the South - east storm and so passes the day.

Dowie returned about 4 P.M. - over a day waiting to hear from Joe - no answer to our telegram - don't understand it.

We must wait until we get to Fashan. Hassan was possessed with the spirit of the devie and the others said men go to sleep in the little felucca. G'Ma was somewhat alarmed but we heard nothing more.

15<sup>th</sup> day

15 miles

Friday Dec 7 Day opens still and fair with light air from the west we ran out anchor several times across the river and finally put out the sails around 11 am. making headway up the river.

Mr David's boat is being towed past us going up - too far off to recognize anyone but a handkerchief was waved from a window.

We hope the handkerchief is broken.

We made about 15 miles today and parked after miles above Fashan - East bank.

16<sup>th</sup> day

46 miles

Saturday Dec 8. The day opens fair with a good wind from the North which kept increasing until it was almost a gale and which boreled us along finely and we reached Frcken by 6 o'clock P.M.

We found postac card at P.O. from Joe mailed some letters and telegraphed to Joe to answer at Makagah

17<sup>th</sup> day

19 miles

Sunday Dec 9 Day opens fair but no wind  
Some trouble getting an early start.  
10.11 A.M. we made a start with a fair wind and reached Makagah at 3.15 where we found a post card and a telegram from Joe giving us two weeks later news from him - from thence with a failing wind we fetched up at Sharona about 6 miles further on - after dark. Being tired of doing nothing the old folks went to bed early and so ends this day.

18<sup>th</sup> day

11 miles

Monday Dec 10 The day opened bright at sunrise a heavy mist put in with an gloomy look

18<sup>th</sup> continued

Dec 10. Mother picked up a Coptic friend in a white nightgown who escorted her through the village and visited two or three churches & a private house. I and Dowd in the mean time was interviewing two of the Sheiks.

About 12:30 the men took to tracking and at present writing are making fair time. I think the crew has a sheep somewhere about. 1 P.M. Stopped tracking and tea up.

The sheep above mentioned turns out to be a fish a yard long which one of the sailors caught.

Progress about half a mile.

And here we rest for the night unless a good wind comes & if so the red wind goes on.

Dec 11<sup>th</sup> Tuesday No wind all day

Charcoal getting short, not able to find any.

Comma and Dancette went to Am. Church (Presbyterian) this evening, by invitation.

Four watchmen 1/2 guard all night unknown to us and kept the dogs by crackling of the fire.

19<sup>th</sup> day

Wednesday Dec 12 Day opened still but at 9 o'clock  
with increasing North <sup>W.E.W.</sup> wind we start.

After working hard poling and light winds help  
about 9 o'clock we made just a few miles  
below Mineah.

21<sup>st</sup> day

172 miles

Thursday Dec 13 Fair and still until  
10.30 when a good wind came up and  
we made a start. 12.30 arrived at Mineah  
and as we are out of charcoal, are obliged  
to stop and mourn to see the good wind go  
bye - and for us wasted - Malish -

Stores are bought by both Crew & passengers  
and at 2 P.M. we are again off for Suxor.  
At 7.30 we moored about a mile above  
Beni Hassan on the West Bank

22<sup>nd</sup> day

Friday Dec 14 Day opens fair. H.A.C.O. Str  
Nubia went up early this am. Towing a native boat  
8.00 a.m. we start - tracking - to get around a curve.  
Fair wind all day but very crooked river. Made landings about  
two miles above Tel el umana. At 8 o'clock all a-bed except Janette.

Sunday Dec 16<sup>th</sup> Day opens quiet - no wind  
He ask the Captain to leave the boat & moved  
a short distance up stream to a better place  
as this bank we are at is high <sup>and dusty</sup> and hard  
to climb. Three of the men absolutely refuse  
to work - claiming a money dispute and when  
the Capt threatens to discharge them at once  
most of the others say they would be afraid to  
go on without them and they would leave.

5 of our crew of 12 we have the two Rais  
two sailors - cook and our own men - nothing

and now we are the Rais has gone to a  
village some way off to see the Moudir  
and see what can be done.

Hope we will have no trouble but am ready  
for it if it must come. Juskhallah

24<sup>th</sup>

Dec. 16 Instead of paying the men 1½ £ the Mondeir ordered that they had paid 100 P.T. and discharged which leaves us here short of men to get to Assistant and for which we blame the Mondeir in as much as the mean time of our mouth had not expired. If we get a good wind we will try to get to Assistant where with the help of a ship and a new crew which the Capt. will get we hope to continue our Voyage.

25<sup>th</sup> day

Sailor whom the Capt. sent to get more crew - I doubt his  
ability to do so. He got about 40 letters and several of  
clippings - no worse from Joe later than Dec.  
10. Douie & Douie went swimming at Dior Dros - about

9 P.M. we Yuseff & Capt. who agreed to meet us there - we  
got a boat & a raft who led us a course of 1½ hrs. of  
bridges & ditches & danna fields & at last we arrived where  
we had left the boat in 8° m. "What shall we do"  
We go to the little mud village & try in vain to wake  
any one up at last a 7½ hr old  
old fellow furnishes us with a light and 3-  
blankets & sleeping outside the door are got to bed,  
I am to at 3 a.m. Douie at 6

8.00 The old guy to his daughter to put a large by  
hand on her head - he takes the same package of clothes  
& we wait & the station an hour to come.

26 cont'd dec 18 We go up to Deirout to chance finding the boat and succeed finally

What the ladies have to say I hear but think they have written sometime - Certainly they must have been worried - I knew nothing about moving the boat until after we were in the train for Assuit except that it was said that if the wind would permit the Capt would move the boat further up to a better place & nearer the Station & that he would do so at the telegraph office

It seems that the wind being good the Capt took the liberty without consultation to start the boat with practically no crew - left no word at the Station - but was in hopes to reach Deirout in time to telegraph us at assuit of the change - but unfortunately he got into a place just before reaching Deirout - which when reached he rushed up to the RR Station in hopes to get us out of the Cars there - but he was too late - a miscalculation & misadventure - 11:15 am we start from Deirout and make about 18 miles

28<sup>th</sup> day

Thursday Dec. 20 We left Umm El Ouseil at 6.30 fair but light wind - we found very bad sailing - the course was nearly a double letter S, at about 11 miles just at the last of the mountains we found Dufordi with two sailors that the had not yet arrived.

Yesterday while Dowie & the Gov. was away & the vessel was sailing off ground just before reaching Dufordi - see the women on board helped work out of the water & the men dried themselves, tearing & wetting their clothes but succeeded to dry the Capt & Yself with some difficulty - I turned the boat a long way while the Gov & Mahomet & the cook rolled when needed - we all have worked our passage so far -

The landed about 3 miles below the dam at Assal or dusk - The Dahabiyah Dongola belonging to an Austrian Prince came up behind us after dinner the Gov. changed his shirt & costume and with Dowie & a visiting card made him a call and was nicely received - He was 12 days from Cairo He offered any help he had & even offered to loan me money.

29<sup>th</sup> day

2 Rain 2 min.

Friday Dec 31 Early this A.M. all hands took hold and we made a start with the small sail only finally we reached the draw of the bridge the big sail being let loose as the wind was failing - we went through all right and there on the bank was Joe who had been chasing us down the river for two days - we were all very glad to see him.

We moored at the bank some way above the bridge. The two sailors then left us - the money question being the matter as is usual.

P.M. Mother & I went to find the Am. consule to have him witness the deed Aunty sent us - He had just gone to Cairo for two weeks - He is called the richest man in these parts and lives in a fine house beautifully furnished & laid out gardens.

His brother & wife who both spoke excellent English entertained us with coffee cigarettes & flowers & wanted to take their carriage to give us a drive about the town which we

absent just at this time. We have given  
owner time to get here at about noon. It appears that  
by assistance of Rai, if am. Consul he has obtained  
six men but as he did not tell of we supposed it was  
at least night when he said he had no men - so we telegraphed  
Great disturbance in the boat - <sup>Capt.</sup> Cook left -  
Owner telegraphed "Why we wanted him - hope it has  
been arranged - The Capt. ought to have told us

Dec. 22 Saturday Capt sent to Orono for money by telegraph but owner said it would come by post. New crew will not come aboard until the money comes - bread making on the river. Capt. Cook was down with his mother who wanted him to go with us - he refuses & goes off "impulsive".

Sunday Dec. 23 Day opens clear with brisk North wind which held through the night with low moon and this wind we could & probably would have put in a good run if the Capt. once had had his way about the money from Cairo.

11.30 new crew of 6 men came aboard with bread - Capt. Cook refuse to go.

And off we go. The Austrian Barca "Dongola" is not present but I venture the statement that we are to be visited to night. But with only one sail up - they could not go slow enough and soon passed us towing & saluting. Made about 4 miles an hour by a lee line. 6 o'clock off Gizeh - 7 o'clock arrived

Dec. 23 At about 9 P.M. after heavy and laborious pulling & poleing we got into deeper water when our line broke and we thought our anchor gone but by skillful management it was secured - one of the men stripped and went under for it.

At 11. I retired - the boat under sail - at 2 was awokened by the mens cries while poleing 1.30 off again - have just passed what I suppose is the Dongola tied up at the bank.

Monday Dec. 24 6 AM. finds us quite near Maracha - steer as now here this makes the fourth time last night.

12.15 The Dongola passed us just above Sohag amidst great excitement - a native boat getting in both of our ways.

We kept on until 2 AM. with a failing wind, & reached within four miles of Nag Hamadi

38<sup>o</sup> day

Tuesday Dec 25 Christmas day opens with no wind to speak of we got some milk and began to <sup>8am</sup> pole. The children had their stockings hung and when dressed in their white clothes they came out in great excitement to see what Santa Claus had left. They said "when are the other presents that he has" but on the whole they were very well satisfied and enjoyed passing to the crew candy cigarettes &c to the crew who passed the usual thanks.

With calm and puffs of wind we kept in motion most of the day. We had an exciting time colliding with a native boat which tried to cross our bow. The native should require wind enough to run side our side of property.

We reached the R.R. bridge at Toghtamandy early in the night

34<sup>th</sup> day

High Hamada

Wednesday Dec 26<sup>th</sup> Day opens with light South Wind (our same old friend who hates to leave us) We have through the bridge at 8 a.m. & moor just below the Dragola - The Baron & his deck make us a cup before we are hardly runned & invite us to a walk or to go aboard his boat. She is a fine one and very comfortable but would not be large enough for us.

35<sup>th</sup> day

High Hamada

Thursday Dec. 27 Day opens quiet.

The Baron took a tug this am at 6 - & left. He priced a tug to Luxor 15 £ and 10 £ to Komua and we told them to go to -- The wind at night face was Westerly and we had hopes but it did not give the breeze so Joe takes the train at 8:30 for Luxor and we remain in Hamada.

36<sup>th</sup> day

Friday Dec 28 Day opens light wind S.E. - at 8 o'clock we took rope & freedom until about 10:30 - Our old friend Alohi passed us in a tug. He is Captain now and

is employed at Ema at the building of the new R.R. bridge there. At 1 o'clock a gentle breeze struck in from the North and we sailed

We reached and went around the bad water. A more serious quarrel occurred between the two Reis. I pity our Reis he is not having a very good time and so far into this time has kept his temper very well.

We pegged along with a light wind and about dark Jusseff was sent ashore to buy victuals. The Reis said that if we had a good wind he did not wish to delay in the morning. We drifted some way beyond the small village and began to think that something had happened to him - the sailors said so and that it was a bad tame. But we sent the boat ashore and after a time he appeared. Not long after in trying to get beyond a point of land with light wind the current carried us off a back and we collided with a native freight boat which was very close under our stern - we took on board a man

near Tan.

with our socks about parted and such again  
and the stern outrigger of the ghezzor went clear  
through our "cook shop" scaring its toes as well as  
all hands. We then tied up for repairs at winter 8 P.M.

There seems to be a large village across the  
river with perhaps 100 dogs and 5 children to each one  
all barking and shrieking - having a fantasia  
perfect balance. On the whole an exciting day.

37<sup>th</sup> day

Saturday Dec. 29 This day opens fine with a  
light westerly wind and as far as it goes is good  
for us - By poling tracking & the wind we make  
a mile or so and at 10 o'clock we are again fast  
to the mud on the opposite bank and by good  
luck avoided running into any boats but the banks  
suffered some. At 9 P.M. we are sailing along  
finely and approaching Kenna and hope to make a  
good run tonight. So far only 3 Sahabiyahs have passed  
us up with steam and 2 down as with steam.

Where is Prof Syce? - We sailed all night with  
a light wind and at 6.30 anchored opposite Ballas  
in a Yuseff mad ashore for milk.

38<sup>th</sup> day  
at Dallas

Sunday Dec. 30 Day opens fine but with a light wind which we hope will strengthen as the day goes on.  
8.0? We start slowly and by sailing - poling and tracking with a failing wind at 3.30 we reach Koss where we expect to spend the night unless a good wind comes up, in which case we will start. Coming over I and 3 men took a long walk to the station and wireless for our position.

39<sup>th</sup> day

Koss 11.6.1.

Monday Dec. 31<sup>st</sup> This day opens still with no wind only a little air from the East at noon. 9 o'clock we take to the rope & pull for an hour or so and then stop at another mud bank just around a corner! 6.15 A puffy West wind put in and we started off with great delight in hopes of reaching Luxor this year. Dowie has festooned the upper deck with Sweet branches & palm leaves so it looks like a German beer garden. Wind failing we came to anchor at 8.30 - in hopes.—

puffs of smoke from the boat at 6 o'clock we are taken  
up temporarily at the shore in sight of Luxor and  
by guess 4 miles distant - no milk, whisky, chickens  
or any thing else provided for dinner and we  
are all pretty luffey and generally disgruntled.  
Our upper deck is all festooned for the day and it  
will be a fast number when we get up.

After the moon arose we had an East wind and  
tried it again but the wind soon died out and  
we may crossed the river and came to anchor  
The have alone our old st but can't fetch it.

41<sup>st</sup> day  
2 miles North Komai  
Luxor

Wednesday Jan 2 Day opens little and Soriably  
the commence to track about 8 am - all houses  
except Eufordy who has gone to Luxor for bread for  
cow & I give tobacco for this.  
About 11 am. Joe & Eufordy came aboard and  
soon after we moored at Luxor & the voyage up is  
finished.

## The Return

Tuesday Feb. 26 At 2:30 we cast off and with a light South wind we started, leaving Joe - Some visitors and the rabbits disconcerted behind us. A gaffer called for watching the boat asked for backsheef, but as it was the first time I had seen him I did not respond to his desires - Jannette left us this am. early ~~that afternoon~~  
 As the Reis wishes to stay a day at Naghamadi to make bread he rowed till about 11 P.M. making about 45 miles and put up opposite Kuss

Wednesday Feb. 27 Day opens still and warm  
 As one overtook him last night is passed us just as we started. <sup>about</sup> 8 o'clock no wind & he had. After rowing an hour or so a good South wind came up and we sailed to Kenna (1/2 mile) when wind lapsed. 6 P.M. we passed Dishner - Sailors sent for mict. 7-30 we tied up at bank a mile or so below.

Thursday Feb. 28 Left the shore at 6 1/4. no wind). 11 o'clock at Naghamadi.

4<sup>th</sup> day

on we came to anchor at 8 o'clock. where we are

and took train to Balliana - telegraphed to  
Joe re' got answer and returned to above  
place where by orders left, if they could the  
boat was to find us, it was well as we gained  
a few miles and saved my old bones a long  
and bad walk - thanks be -

6<sup>th</sup> day

Sunday March 3 Day opens quiet and we take the oars at 6 am, in two hours we reach Baliana and proceed. 9 o'clock a strong North wind comes up and to avoid going ashore on the wrong side of the river - as usual - we come to anchor in mid-stream a mile or two below Baliana.

Quite a sea came up and the R's up-side and made for the other side of the river - 1<sup>st</sup> the main shat broke - then the felucca went adrift then the shore line parted in which seemed natural - I know of one good rope on this craft

7<sup>th</sup> day

Monday March 4 Day opens quiet at 5 am We started and by good luck reached Girga just before the strong North wind came up at 10 o'clock. We then all went to the station and met Mr and Miss McDonald who is to be our guest to Cairo. After lunch Bonina Miss McDonald drove 12 sailors & myself went across the river and up the hill to see some old tombs.

Well I am glad I went

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8<sup>th</sup> day

Tuesday March 5 - Fair day with light North wind. We started about 5 a.m., and after a good but uneventful day we made 27 miles and moored at Sohag just above Mr. Davis'. The men worked so well that we gave them the money to buy a sheep - hoping that they will be strengthened for more exertions.

9<sup>th</sup> day

Time

Wednesday March 6 The Sheep arrived.

This day opens quiet - we started about 6 by 9 o'clock a South wind helped us along. The Bedouin started before us and keeps just ahead perhaps a mile.

This P.M. the wind failed us but by hard rowing at moored on the west bank about 33 miles from Sohag. One of our sailors took a bad cold at Giza and has been ill ever since - we must send him home at earliest if he gets no better. Asked for brandy which is unusual

10<sup>th</sup> day

Thursday March 7 Day opens quiet - we start about 6 am, Mr. Davis earlier and having reached a place last night where the water was swifter he has joined upon us. The German Baron de Force(?) Dababigh Dougola passed us down toward by A.A. Barge Str Arab. We stopped a while (by wind) at a small Arab town Barn Karus & then headed out & drifted for a mile and then put up at noon for good. Strong North wind. Our sailor man seems to be better.

11<sup>th</sup> day

Friday March 8 Day opens light wind from north We start rowing about 5:30 - blown ashore - get off bang along - about 10 Dowie goes ashore to talk to Abu Tig for bread - then we get a bad stick - pull - name - haley haley - ropes and blocks break - finally get off and drift toward A.T. then on until 8:30 we passed Mr. Davis's boat and moored on the opposite side of river and about 7 miles above Asuit -

12<sup>th</sup> day

Saturday March 9 Day opens fair - we start just after Mr. Davis at 6<sup>30</sup> & arrive at Assuit about 10 - pay visit to Am. Consul execute papers and take carriage to the bazaar where we bought several things and were on coming back to the boat. The Risi concludes to go home to Cairo as his eyes are in very bad shape and he needs immediate treatment, <sup>He does not go</sup> we go through the bazaar at 4 o'clock & proceed a few miles

13<sup>th</sup> day

Sunday March 10 Start about 6 - no wind - about N - wind from South which freshens to strong which bowed us along to 3 or 4 miles below Monfalt where a sharp turn in the river makes the wind a side wind and we <sup>10<sup>30</sup> moor. We think it poor judgment as by the rope and pushing off from the shore we ought to fairly easily get around the point if perhaps a mile then find a good wind to Leicht.</sup>

11.45 we warp across the river - the rope breaks before we get away from bank - old boat sound on bottom I think but broken on top - ropes & blocks also and rotten. 1<sup>30</sup> start rowing the - wind having abated

Sunday March 10 <sup>Cont'd</sup> we get round point & wind  
Lauling to West we are forced to anchor in Mud Stream.  
4 o'clock. we row to & make fast to Bank in a gale.

14<sup>th</sup> day

Monday March 11 Start at 7 drift a mile and stay <sup>Stop 9</sup>  
Stop at 9 1/2 and struck <sup>30</sup> Ell 1/2 row till 6 not a long  
trip in distance.

15<sup>th</sup> day

Tuesday March 12 Start at 6 quiet - rowed down  
past Sir Moies and at 12 o'clock struck when quite  
near the landing at Le Amara, soon after get  
off - eat our lunch and all but mother take donkeys  
minus stirrups & bridles and hardly any saddles and visit  
the North tombs on returning visit the Palace which  
being near the boat Mother & Dovie visited - had a  
call from the Head man who wanted the usual  
medecines -

16<sup>th</sup> day

Wednesday March 13 Start at 6 - drifting. D & Dovie  
left at Malari for town  
arrived at Rhode 2 PM went to station & saw for the W  
GO-BY started on at 4 - men got a sleek. Arrive at  
Beni Hassan at 7:25 at upper landing

Thursday March 14 Start at 6 get early breakfast. Mother Kindy stays with kids the rest take donkeys, mnis bridles & stirrups & with the old Skook for guard - visit the N. tombs & Rock temple return to boat & start at 10<sup>30</sup> with gentle air from the South Arrive at Minea about 2<sup>00</sup> and found Joe & Mrs W. left Miss McDonald - lost 2 hours of good wind & proceeded to Samalut for the night

18<sup>th</sup> day

Friday March 15 Start at 6 - rowing - about 9 we aground - get off and the wind blows us ashore where we remain all day watching native boats - tugs & dabbagh, get stuck off. We are near the mouth of Eilee et-Ter

19<sup>th</sup> day

Saturday March 16 Day opens fair - Start early soon after a gentle breeze from the South 11<sup>30</sup> blown ashore near (18<sup>th</sup> day up) Coptic church place off on again - 4<sup>00</sup> another start for boats & water jars

20<sup>th</sup> day

Sunday March 17 Day opens still - we make an early start rowing soon a fine South wind but just below Farcken we got aground with a lot of natives - ropes break - we pull shawl for about 3 hours finally at 1 we get off & with a fair wind seek for other shoals & at 2<sup>nd</sup> Stop at Bitta for rest and to enquire the way at 4 we start again & pass many "stuck boat" and haul up at 7 a few miles above Beni Souif

21<sup>st</sup> day

Monday March 18 Day opens fair - rowing off Beni Souif ran aground - looked serious for a while but we got off and a fair wind coming up we made good progress until 11<sup>th</sup> the wind forced us ashore on S. bank where we remained till 5<sup>th</sup> the wind seemed fair but the River was afraid (?) to go on before

22<sup>d</sup>

Tuesday March 19 Day opens quiet - start 6 - meet Str. with Mrs. Gauger & family with letter intimation from Mr. Kelley - venture cases. At 3<sup>rd</sup> we moored at place we left on 15<sup>th</sup> day up

23<sup>rd</sup> day

Wednesday March 20 Started early - went out to middle of the river and then put back - Strong North gale all day

Thursday March 21 Started about 4<sup>15</sup> am being out of bread the crew are trying to get to some town where it can be procured.

Goddard went ashore after making some miles waiting hour or so put out into the stream & then went back - gained 10 ft. or so. The man went to next town in hopes of getting bread after getting 50 P.Y. out of us. At 4 PM we start again till 7<sup>30</sup>

25<sup>th</sup> day

Friday March 22 Day open still - Start at 6 by 7 Light mist from South 11<sup>30</sup> put jashore at Bedrashem - At 3<sup>30</sup> we anchor in front of the draw of the new bridge at Cairo which they say does not open until 10 tomorrow. 11 minutes after this writing the draw opened - we went through and moored a mile S. of our old place but are promised a better place tomorrow and the Voyage ends at 4.20 —
